## Tampa Bay's Hidden Anchorages Guide

### The Ultimate Navigator's Guide

We've compiled 25+ years of active knowledge and 5,000+ guest experiences into this guide to Tampa Bay's best-kept anchorages. Each location includes GPS coordinates, approach strategies, seasonal tips, and Captain Jay's Navigation Intelligence—insider wisdom tested by decades on the water.

### 1. Whiskey Key Shallows

GPS: 27°42'18"N, 82°37'45"W

Depth: 4-6 ft (MLW)Best Tide: Mid-high

Protection: Southwest winds

Approach Strategy: Enter from Bunces Pass channel, holding 6+ ft until final approach. Look for the dead tree on the eastern shore as a landmark. Anchor just north of the sandbar.

Captain Jay's Tip: "Read the water color—light green means go, dark patches are grass beds. I've been using this spot for 15 years when the bay gets choppy."

### 2. Mullet Key North Pocket

GPS: 27°39'42"N, 82°44'28"W

Depth: 8-12 ftBest Tide: Any

• Protection: North & east winds

Approach Strategy: From the ship channel, head northeast toward the beach line. Clear the shallow bar (marked by a stake), then favor the western side.

Seasonal Notes: Reliable year-round. Excellent in summer storms and winter northeasters.

### **Special Features:**

- Beach access
- Grass flat fishing
- Close to Egmont Key

Captain Jay's Tip: "Looks unremarkable on the chart but is perfect for overnights. Position in deeper water near the old pilings."

### 3. Shell Key Backwater

GPS: 27°43'15"N, 82°46'12"W

• Depth: 5-8 ft

Best Tide: High tide entryProtection: All except NW

Approach Strategy: Enter via the north cut (visible from Pass-a-Grille). Follow the natural deeper channel curving southeast.

Seasonal Notes: Best in spring-fall. Winter storms shift sandbars—scout first.

Safety Alert: Shallow entrance; never attempt on a falling tide. Max draft: 4 ft.

Captain Jay's Tip: "The backside feels like another world—crystal-clear water and white sand most boaters never see."

### 4. Egmont Key Northwest Cove

GPS: 27°36'08"N, 82°45'55"W

Depth: 12-18 ftBest Tide: Any

• Protection: South & southeast

Approach Strategy: Round Egmont from the south, stay deep, and anchor in 14–16 ft avoiding rocks.

#### **Seasonal Notes:**

• Winter: best protection during cold fronts

• Summer: prime for diving/snorkeling

Spring/Fall: most comfortable

#### **Special Features:**

- Historic fort ruins
- Great fishing structure
- Severe-weather haven

Captain Jay's Tip: "When the Gulf gets angry, this is sanctuary."

### 5. Passage Key Hidden Harbor

GPS: 27°31'22"N, 82°44'35"W

Depth: 6-10 ft

• Best Tide: Mid-high

• Protection: North & east

Approach Strategy: From Anna Maria Sound, head southwest. Anchor behind the sand spit in deeper water.

Seasonal Notes: Great year-round. Winter solitude, summer clear waters.

### **Special Features:**

- Exceptional shelling
- Wildlife viewing
- Some of the clearest water in Tampa Bay

Captain Jay's Tip: "Most miss this, anchoring on the exposed Gulf side. This hidden spot is like a private marina."

### 6. Bunces Pass Secret Spot

GPS: 27°41'55"N, 82°45'08"W

Depth: 8-14 ftBest Tide: Any

Protection: West & southwest

Captain Jay's Tip: "In the busiest pass, there's this calm pocket almost everyone skips. The current eddy gives protection and top-notch fishing."

### 7. Tierra Verde Tucked Bay

GPS: 27°40'28"N, 82°42'15"W

• Depth: 6-9 ft

Best Tide: Mid-highProtection: Northwest

Approach Strategy: From ICW, turn east toward Tierra Verde. Anchor in southern portion for consistency.

#### **Seasonal Notes:**

Winter: refuge from cold fronts

Summer: walk to restaurants

• Fall: most pleasant

#### **Special Features:**

- Walkable to provisions
- Strong protection
- Near Fort De Soto

Captain Jay's Tip: "Deep enough, well-protected, and close enough to kayak to dinner."

### 8. Fort De Soto Hidden Cove

GPS: 27°37'45"N, 82°43'02"W

Depth: 10-15 ftBest Tide: Any

• Protection: East & southeast

Approach Strategy: Round Fort De Soto from the north, anchor in 12-14 ft.

Seasonal Notes: Excellent in winter and mild in spring/fall. Summer can get crowded.

#### **Special Features:**

- Park access
- Historic fort
- Great sunsets

Captain Jay's Tip: "The real gem is the cove on the park's west side—anchors hold like concrete."

### 9. Manatee River Secret Bend

• GPS: 27°31'48"N, 82°33'22"W

Depth: 12-20 ftBest Tide: Any

• Protection: Complete

Approach Strategy: Follow channel to marker 47, then hug the eastern shore. Best holding mid-channel.

#### Seasonal Notes:

Summer: cool water, storm protection

• Spring/Fall: great fishing

### • Winter: watch for manatees

#### **Special Features:**

- Total weather protection
- Freshwater mix for cooler temps
- Scenic tree-lined shores

Captain Jay's Tip: "It's like anchoring in a natural harbor—peaceful and secure."

### 10. Little Manatee Quiet Waters

GPS: 27°29'15"N, 82°31'05"W

• Depth: 8-12 ft

• Best Tide: Rising tide entry

• Protection: Complete

Approach Strategy: Enter on rising tide, pass the entrance bar, and anchor in the deep pool at first bend.

#### Seasonal Notes:

• Hurricane season: ultimate protection

• Summer: cool freshwater escape

• Spring: top fishing and wildlife

Safety Alert: Need 3-ft tide minimum for safe entrance.

### **Special Features:**

- Storm shelter
- Great fishing & kayaking
- Unique freshwater/saltwater ecosystem

Captain Jay's Tip: "Deep, protected, and peaceful—if you time the tide right."
